Worship Notes

George F. Handel (1685-1759), a German born composer and contemporary of J. S. Bach, settled in London early in his career and is buried in Westminster Abbey. Handel composed the music for *Messiah* over the course of just 24 days in 1741 after receiving the libretto (the words) sent to him by his patron, friend, and collaborator, Charles Jennens. It is not entirely accurate to say Jennens wrote the libretto because it is comprised of scripture passages from the King James Version of the Bible. Jennens used verses from 14 books—prophets, psalms, Gospels, and epistles—to tell the story of God's anointed one ("Messiah") from his foretelling by the prophets to Jesus' birth, life, death, and resurrection to the heavenly celebration of his triumph over evil and death.

Cover Art: "Christ Risen from the Tomb" by artist Ambrogio Burgognone (1453-1523) from Italy.
